By evening the flood reached the South Platte near Littleton, and was proceeding toward Denver. Flood waters spread to 1/2 mile or more in width and destroyed homes, trailer courts, businesses or anything in its path causing damages estimated as high as \$250 million or more in Metropolitan Denver. The flood waters passed on through Denver to add to the already flooded South Platte River through Fort Morgan, Sterling and Julesburg on into Nebraska.
