			A tropical depression which formed in the southwestern Gulf of Mexico on October 14th moved inland on the Louisiana coast the night of October 16th and merged with a cold front. The resultant low pressure system intensified and moved up through the Appalachian Mountains with the trailing cold front moving through Florida.						
			Northwestern Florida, still not fully recovered from Hurricane Eloise in September, received heavy rainfall, at least two small tornadoes, high winds, rough seas and high tides. Wind gusts to 45 mph and tides 4 feet above normal were reported in some sections. The primary effect of northeastern Florida was flooding from heavy rainfall and some beach erosion. No deaths or injuries were reported in Florida in connection with the depression.						
			Heaviest rainfall amounts ranged from four to at least six inches in some sections. Widespread street flooding occurred and some state roads were closed briefly due to flooding. Probably the most damage occurred in the Panama City area, which also was hard-hit by Hurricane Eloise. In addition to further erosion along the beaches by high tides and rough seas, many roofs of motels were still off since Eloise, and interiors sustained additional damage with heavy rainfall. Also, a tornado in Panama City Beach damaged or destroyed several buildings. (Gusty winds, rough seas and high tides were reported along the west coast of Florida Peninsula October 17-18 prior to and after the cold front moved across the peninsula.)

By the night of the 15th the combined effects of a slow, southeast moving cold front in central Arkansas, and the northeast moving tropical depression then south of New Orleans began producing copious rainfall amounts over most of the State. A Flash Flood Watch was in effect for the southern 2/3 of Mississippi from 7:15 AM on the 16th until 2 AM on the 17th. Many counties in central and west-central Mississippi were under flash flood warnings between 11 AM and 8 PM on the 16th.
									Extensive flooding occurred in the Jackson and Vicksburg metropolitan areas as sewers and low lying areas could not discharge the continuously accumulating rainfall. Barricades went up as streets flooded. Many minor auto accidents occurred along with stalled vehicles because of high water. Water also flooded state roads.
									Flooding in Canton resulted mostly from backwater from Bear Creek along with 8" of rain. Water covered 40 square blocks and forced 200 people from their homes as water got up to 4' deep in streets and yards. Flash flooding and high water caused the evacuation of 25 people in Pearl when water entered homes, seriously damaging 30, and rose to a depth of 3' in some trailer parks; two families were evacuated in Vicksburg; and several children in Jackson couldn't reach their apartments due to high water.
									Storm rainfall totals ranged from 1" or less in NW Mississippi to general rains of 3 - 6" over the rest of the state. Heaviest rains included Madison County Fire Tower 8.88, Yazoo City 8.66, NE Jackson 8.20, Canton 7.99, Louisville 7.76, and Ross Barnett Reservoir 7.29 inches. This was the wettest October 16 for Jackson since records began in 1896 with 6.35" recorded. The previous record was 2.48" in 1932. 6.99" fell on the 15 - 16th... the greatest ever for a 24 hour period in October. The rain decreased in west-central portions of the state during the afternoon of the 16th, and except for some light rain and drizzle, ended in the east-central portions the morning of the 17th.
									The single death attributed to the storm resulted when a young teenage girl drowned on the afternoon of the 16th after falling in rain-swollen Town Creek which runs through Jackson.
									A tornado watch was in effect for 19 SE Mississippi counties from 4 PM - 10 PM on the 16th, but the only severe weather reported was a funnel cloud during the morning hours. Tides up to 3 feet hampered coastal activities along with 35 mph winds.
