More than 50 traffic accidents caused closure of most major roads in the San Bernardino and San Jacinto mountains, after the first winter storm of the season dumped up to 2 feet of snow in the area. Rain showers covered the rest of the Los Angeles Basin, only a trace was recorded at the Civic Center in L.A. Chill winds generated by the storm reached 50 mph at Huntington beach.									
The high temperature at downtown L.A. only went up to 54 degrees -tying a record set for the date set in 1895. There were numerous injuries but no auto fatalities.									
A light plane with three persons was missing near Big Bear in the San Bernardino mountains. The pilot reported heavy turbulence and downdrafts at 4:15 pm Friday the 28th. The bodies of these three individuals was found about a week later.									
Big Bear and the surrounding national forest had 16 inches of snow. Drifts up to 4 feet was common. Twenty campers snowbound in the mountains was rescued a few days later.

		Fast moving cold front passed Kauai with accompanying gale-force southerly winds and quasi-stationary low developed from above just northwest of State establishing southerly winds and heavy rain over entire State. Total 4-day rainfall for period 24-27 at Honolulu Airport was 11.34 inches. This was greatest 4-day total since February 1955 which had 11.56 inches for 22-25.							
		On 23rd: Man knocked into sea by large wave drowned at Onekahakaha Beach, Hawaii Island. In afternoon, 2 men at Magic Sands Beach, Hawaii Island, caught in strong surf, sustained head injuries and shoulder and ankle injuries, respectively.							
		On 24th: At 6:35a. 17-foot skiff, valued at \$7,000, torn loose from mooring by high surf completely demolished in pounding against sea wall in Kailua Bay, Hawaii Island. No one close together in rough seas off Lahaina, Maui, submarine banged against submarine tender reportedly causing minor damage to side of tender. At Kihei, Maui in the afternoon, short but intense rain (2.8 inches in 1 hour 40 minutes) caused rushing water, almost a foot deep, over Kihei Road stalling cars and flooding 3 homes. In the afternoon strong southerly winds and high seas drove 180-foot South Korean fishing vessel aground 50 yards off Sand Island, Oahu. 41-foot Coast Guard rescue boat became grounded 200 yards off shore.							
		On 25th: Overflow from drainage system flooded homes in Hickam AFB housing area and forced evacuation of 30 families.

		A storm moved eastward across the State causing wind gusts to 50 miles per hour at Boise, 55 miles per hour at Pocatello, and an average speed of 39 miles per hour for one minute at Kimberly. Winds damaged utilities across Southern Idaho including power poles blown down near Homedale, Dwyhee County, and heavy utility damage in Canyon County. Two mobile homes in transit were heavily damaged near Caldwell, Canyon County and another in Pocatello, Bannock County. A concrete block wall 30 feet high and 150 feet long was blown down in Boise, Ada County, causing over \$40,000 damage, and other miscellaneous wind damage was reported there. Uprooted trees caused some building and vehicle damage in addition to utility line damage. Heavy snow fell in Central areas of Idaho including Blaine County with about 14 inches in the North Fork area 7 miles north of Ketchum, and 8 inches at Mc Call, Valley County. Snow added to utility damage and traffic problems and accidents. Snow in Northern Idaho caused slick roads and numerous accidents, mostly minor.

		An unusually heavy snowstorm for so early in the season hit most of the state accompanied by strong winds and rapidly falling temperatures. Up to 30 inches of new snow was reported with over 20 inches at Island Park, Ashton and other upper elevations. Valley amounts were variable with only light amounts in southwest valleys, 2 to 4 inches in other southern valleys, and 8 inches at Wallace, Shoshone County. Numerous traffic accidents were attributed to snow and slick roads.

		Heavy snow whipped by 50 to 60 miles per hour winds at places closed some roads and stranded hundreds of motorists. Many schools were closed. Snow amounts ranged from about a foot in higher elevations to 1 or 2 inches in southwestern valleys. Damage to electric utilities was reported. Many thousands of dollars were spent on snow removal, sanding streets and clean up operations.

		An intense low pressure system passing across the Midwest brought heavy thunderstorms, high winds, and three tornadoes to Illinois during the evening and early morning hours of the 9th and 10th. Most damage in the state was minor and confined to snapped tree limbs, broken windows, and some downed power lines.							
		As the storm began moving into the west central and northwest sections of the state, winds were driven to 65mph at Andalusia at 7:35pm. At 8:01pm winds gusted to 60mph at the Noline Quad-City Airport causing a few power outages in the vicinity as broken tree limbs helped snap power lines. About 8:10pm the Jo Daviess county sheriff reported a barn roof blown off by high winds on a farm three miles north of Galena; a garage was blown down about the same time two and a half miles north of Hanover.

		In central Illinois three persons were injured about 10pm when thunderstorm winds overturned their mobile home in rural New Berlin. At Springfield's Capital Airport to the northeast, winds peaked at 59mph at 10:01pm. An airplane hangar collapsed and three airplanes were extensively damaged as the result of strong winds which struck the Taylorville Municipal Airport about 10:28pm. South and west of Stevedson the storms whipped through three farms destroying two barns and damaging a third; a sixty-year-old barn was reported to have been moved eight feet north as the winds howled through about 11:10pm. At 11:30pm winds gusted to 70mph at Bloomington-Normal caused some power outages. A tool shed, windmill, and two corn cribs were destroyed by the wind five miles southeast of Brandtville in rural McLean county.							
		The storm's fury began to affect northeast Illinois by 11:35pm when winds were clocked at 63mph at DuPage County Airport in West Chicago. At 11:50pm gusts in excess of 75mph were reported in Streamwood while gusts to 66mph were noted at Tinley Park at 12:30am on the 10th. Strong winds blew a small garden shed across a house in Gurnee at 12:25pm.							
		In the east central section of the state most damage occurred after midnight in the early morning hours of the 10th. Strong winds knocked a mobile home off its foundation one and a half miles north of Clarence at 12:30am injuring its two occupants; two other persons were injured as the wind destroyed a mobile home at Mahomet.							
		Trailer homes were also damaged or destroyed just southwest of Gifford at 11:55pm and at Ludlow shortly after midnight; no one was injured. A barn a mile north of L'Erable was completely leveled about midnight. Winds unroofed an outbuilding on a farm northeast of St. Anne shortly after midnight.							
		In the far southern portion of Illinois, high winds tore through a subdivision at the Lake of Egypt about twelve miles southeast of Marion at 12:15pm flipping two mobile homes on their sides and damaging eight others; no injuries were reported. About 1:15am the wind storm struck the Elchorn community destroying a hangar at a private airstrip.

Although bringing a "white Thanksgiving" to much of the state, the heavy snow closed many roads and made holiday travel extremely hazardous and difficult on others. Numerous auto accidents were reported; some air travel was disrupted.

		The second windstorm of the month caused scattered damage ranging from broken tree limbs to destroyed mobile homes in a large portion of the state. Much minor damage was noted across the state to tree limbs, windows, etc.; several areas were without power for short periods as the wind snapped lines.							
		High winds raked the extreme north central section of the state after 9pm. Strong winds lifted the roof from a house under construction near Harrison at 9:30pm. Several other buildings sustained minor damage in the area; a mobile home was overturned on Shirland Road one mile north of IL 75. In Durand, the wind destroyed a pole building sending broken timbers over a large area. Numerous reports of felled trees were noted.							
		In the southern portions of the state, the Williamson County airport control tower reported gusts to 69mph at 10pm Saturday knocking down a garage and blowing over a large building under construction. Strong gusts later in the evening tore the roof off the Cambria Grade School. Considerable damage occurred at the Effingham County Municipal Airport about 2am as the winds ripped the roofs from several hangars; a number of frames for new houses were twisted or ripped apart by the violent wind. A mobile home northeast of Thompsonville was destroyed by the wind about 2am; its only occupant was treated for minor injuries.
