									Hurricane Jeanne, a late season storm formed from a depression in the western Caribbean. The storm moved on a generally west north-west course across the southern Gulf finally dying in the western Gulf on the 15th without ever making landfall. The storm's center closest approach to the Louisiana coast was about 200 miles south of Grand Isle on the 13th. Between 3000 and 3500 oil platform workers were evacuated on the 10th and 11th but began returning to work on 13th. There were also some evacuations from lower Jefferson Parish and lower LaFourche Parish, the most notable being approximately 1500 persons leaving Grand Isle. The only damage done in Louisiana by the storm was very minor beach and coastal erosion.

									Anywhere from a trace to one and half inches of snow along with some sleet fell in northwest Louisiana on Thanksgiving Eve. Glazed over bridges and highways resulted in 50 to 100 traffic accidents and iced over trees fell knocking down power lines causing some areas to lose electrical power for a brief period. Otherwise no significant damage was done.

									Northwest winds, following a cold frontal passage, gusted up to 60 mph and required the closing of the Chesapeake Bay Bridge to over-sized vehicular traffic for three hours. A modular home being towed across the new Severn River bridge (U.S. Rt 50) toppled precariously against the railing on the eastbound side. It was righted by a tow truck - aided by a wind break that police formed, using tractor trailers. Elsewhere... minor damage occurred in Baltimore when winds gusted to 40 mph; and at a townhouse project in Columbia, a worker received minor injuries when winds toppled some roof beams. Total damage estimated at about \$2,000.

									Precipitation moved into the western sections mid-day of the 17th and affected the east portions later in the day and into early morning of the 18th. Several inches of sleet accumulated on roads in Garrett and Allegany Counties, necessitating snow emergency plans to be put into effect. Poor road conditions were responsible for a collision near Cumberland, fatal to two persons. In the Hagers-town area snow and ice buildup proke tree limbs and power lines, disrupting electrical service over a wide area. Power outages were also reported in much of the north central portion of the state, with rush-hour traffic snafus in Baltimore during the morning of the 18th. Damage over the state estimated at \$3,000 - \$5,000.

		Snow spread across Eastern Pennsylvania in the late afternoon on the 17th and continued into the afternoon of the 18th over the northern half. Accumulations were generally 6 to 12 inches with up to 15 inches over some mountain sections. Over the southern half accumulations amounted to generally 2 to 5 inches before changing to sleet and freezing rain or all rain and ending early on the 18th. In Philadelphia less than an inch accumulated. The freezing rain resulted in a considerable accumulation of ice which downed utility lines and tree limbs. Over 5000 customers had service interrupted. Sections of York, Adams and Franklin Counties were the hardest hit.

Campsites, small storage buildings, and trees received some damage in the Haskell County area from the weight of accumulated snow.

	<p>Hurricane Jeanne, which developed in the southeastern Gulf of Mexico, had weakened to a tropical storm after drifting westward through the Gulf. T.S. Jeanne became stationary about 115 miles east of Brownsville the night of November 13, but strong easterly winds over the northern Gulf of Mexico between Jeanne and a large high pressure system centered in the southeastern U.S. caused very high swells and breakers as well as above normal tides to affect the entire Texas coast. Severe beach erosion occurred on barrier islands and coastline facing the Gulf from this extremely rare November storm.</p> <p>Although property damages were not great, the large swells, pounding surf, and above normal tides did significant environmental damage to shoreline. Most protective dunes were gone as a result of Hurricane Allen during August 1980 allowing Jeanne's tidal action to create more serious flooding than otherwise would have occurred.</p> <p>Along South Padre Island and the lower Texas coast, tides up to 4 feet above normal isolated Boca Chica and Brazos Island from the mainland. Gulf Blvd. on South Padre Island flooded at places, and Highway 100 was overwashed near the beach. North winds also pushed water from Laguna Madre onto beach roads on the inward side of Padre Island. Along north Padre Island, beach concession stands rebuilt after Hurricane Allen were damaged by Jeanne's tides of 3 feet above normal. At Freeport tides rose as high as 5 feet above normal the night of the 13th. Nearby Brazoria County communities of Surfside and Quintana were evacuated as tides rolled into residential areas. Most of the elevated homes were not damaged, but automobiles suffered saltwater flooding. Beach Drive, County Road 257 from Surfside to San Luis Pass, Farm to Market Road 1495, and County Road 720 at Bryan Beach suffered from various degrees of flooding. Some roads were washed out after having been repaired from Hurricane Allen. Much debris littered Surfside after tides receded. Serious beach erosion occurred also at Galveston where tides ran 3 1/2 feet above normal, around western shores of Galveston Bay where Seabrook had 3 1/2 feet above normal tides, and at Sabine Pass where 3 feet above normal tides and surf put water over Texas Highway 87.</p>

	<p>A rare November snow began the evening of November 25 and ended the morning of the 26th. Although accumulations were not notably large, the timing of the snow and its weight due to high moisture content were significant. Burnet County received to 6 inches causing some limb, tree, and power line breakage. In southern Williamson County 4 inches were recorded at Jarrell, 3 inches at Georgetown and Round Rock, Travis County and the city of Austin had 2 to 3 inches, the first measurable snow there since 1973. Some 2 to 3 inches fell elsewhere in Fredericksburg, Junction, and Kerrville. Highways were briefly closed in places and many traffic accidents, including several fatal ones, occurred because of the snow.</p>

	<p>A sudden isolated thunderstorm moved over the north side of Conroe producing brief damaging wind gusts Thanksgiving afternoon. Damage was centered around a north Conroe shopping center. Nearby a department store and a grocery were damaged also as the wind lifted roofing and tore awnings.</p>

	<p>Widespread heavy snow developed behind a cold front that invaded Western Texas on the 14th and ahead of an upper level disturbance that moved into Western Texas from the southwest. Snowfall began in southwestern Texas early on the night of the 15th, developing northeastward across most of the remainder of Western Texas by the morning of the 16th. Moderate to heavy snowfall began in southwestern Texas early on the morning of the 16th and spread northeastward across most of Western Texas during the day.</p> <p>Heaviest snowfall was reported in the mountains of southwestern Texas with 12 to 15 inches of snow indicated and across the South Plains where amounts averaged from 8 to 11 inches. Over the remainder of Western Texas, amounts varied from near 1 inch to 6 inches. Snowfall ended over most of Western Texas early on the morning of the 17th.</p> <p>Damage costs, due to the storm, are very difficult to summarize or even estimate. Power outages were widespread in southwestern Texas. Livestock and crop damages were reported across the South Plains and business and travel were hampered over most of Western Texas. Perhaps the most dramatic indication of how the storm affected West Texas was the high number of vehicles stalled and travelers stranded. In the Panhandle alone it is estimated that between 400 and 600 vehicles were stalled or abandoned. Between 300 and 500 vehicles were stalled over the South Plains with an additional 200 to 400 vehicles estimated to have been stalled in southwestern Texas. No injuries were reported, however.</p>

	<p>Numerous roads and highways were blocked by drifts that sometimes exceeded 4 feet. Among the more heavily traveled roads that were closed were I-40 from Rango westward to the New Mexico state line; I-10 from Van Horn to Sierra Blanca; and U.S. 87 from Lamasa northward to near Dumas. In addition, most roads in and around the South Plains, the Southwestern Mountains and the Northwestern Permian Basin were closed. In addition to the hazards of slippery and dangerous roads and numerous snowdrifts, visibility was lowered in the snow quite often to less than 1 mile.</p> <p>Most major roads were cleared and normal traffic resumed by mid-day on the 17th. The remainder of the highways were declared usable by the 18th.</p>

	<p>A cold front moving southward into the Texas Panhandle from Colorado combined with an upper level disturbance also moving southward to produce widespread heavy snow over much of Western Texas. Light snow began falling in the northern portion of the Panhandle on the morning of the 24th and spread very slowly southward. Moderate to heavy snow developed in the Panhandle by the evening of the 24th and across the South Plains, Permian Basin and Guadalupe Mountains on the morning of the 25th. By late evening on the 25th, the snow had eased.</p> <p>Snowfall was heaviest over the western two-thirds of the South Plains, averaging 7 to 12 inches. Snowfall over the western two-thirds of the Panhandle varied from 3 to 6 inches. Between 1 and 4 inches were reported from the Guadalupe Mountains eastward across the Permian Basin to near San Angelo and over the remainder of the Panhandle and South Plains. The snowfall problems were increased by winds gusting 20 to 30 miles an hour causing drifts up to 4 and 5 feet.</p> <p>The combination of heavy snow and drifting snow closed numerous roads across the Permian Basin and South Plains. Between 200 and 300 cars and trucks were reported stalled or overturned in the north central and central portions of the Panhandle. A large number of schools and businesses were closed through the 25th in the Panhandle, Permian Basin and South Plains.</p> <p>The only injury directly related to the storm system occurred in El Paso where only a trace of precipitation was received. Strong winds gusting to 43 miles an hour, that accompanied the system as it moved through El Paso, blew large pieces of metal from a construction site. One man was injured when he was struck by flying metal. He was treated and released from the hospital.</p> <p>As with the previous snowstorm, damage figures are merely an estimate and cannot account for losses of business during the event.</p>
